12 Inches to the foot

Well spring has sprung here in the south and with it you naturally want to go flying! It seems that Mother Nature (I call it other things sometimes) has a notion to have the wind blowing at gale force strength every time I'm off work, which isn't often. But the winds will die down a bit in the coming month and we'll have some good flying here at the local fields.

RESEARCHING SCALE MODELS

Sometimes you have a full scale aircraft you want to model but can find little or no documentation on it at all. The first choice I would look under would be the internet. Type in the aircraft manufacturer, the model, and the N number. You might be surprised at what comes up. It's amazing just how much aviation information the internet has on it. Start a file on the airplane you are documenting and search for information, and file it either on your computer or print out a hard copy - or better yet, both!

I had been researching the Gee Bee Model D Sportster for some time and happened to think about putting in the premier model designer for all Gee Bee aircraft, Henry Hafkee. After typing in his name on a Google search, page after page popped up about this designer who sold plans under Model Aviation, Flying Models, and several other magazines. The Model D Sportster had an in-line engine and large wheel pants. At I/4 scale it has a wingspan of 75". I just thought it would be cool to blow that thing up to a nice round number of I00" and I/3rd scale. At that size you could give rides to those small dogs you see at contests!

But the text and information about all of Henry's designs are there on the internet. He also built the following versions of Gee Bee aircraft: Gee Bee Model E I/4 scale, Gee Bee QED, Gee Bee Model Y Senior Sportster I/4 scale and I/5th scale (at I/3rd scale this would truly be a giant of a model at I20"). Also the most famous Gee Bees (the RI) at I/4 scale and the Gee Bee Biplane, and if you care to look there are many others. Almost all of these airplanes are 4 channel models with no flaps so you have to fly all of the maneuvers to get your points. Maybe that's why you don't see very many on the contest circuit today. But the research and history of the Gee Bee aircraft and the Granville Brothers is largely intact thanks to Henry's book Gee Bee- The Real Story of the Granville Brothers and Their Incredible Aircraft. Online retailers are selling this book for as much as \$100 a copy but you should be able to find one for about \$29.95. Plenty of b&w photos and drawings of several of their designs and the history of the racing legend the Granville Brothers brought to life in Springfield, Mass.

Other designs have had much more written about them and there is more documentation on many different designs but you have to find something that excites you and makes you want to spend hundreds of hours in the shop making what my wife lovingly calls "the balsa cloud". Oh well, you have to be there to appreciate it, I guess.

I keep files on many different airplanes and I'm sure some will make it to the workbench and others never will. But I have the documentation to build them if time and health permits.

How many scale models do you have waiting "in the wings" for the time to build them? Some I've been looking at are the P-40E, Stinson SR6, Henschel HS 123 dive bomber, the Cessna C-165 and the Bellanca Cruisemaster 14-19-2 and there is also plans for a 120" Model Y Senior Sportster and a I/3rd scale Model D in there somewhere.

The documentation is out there, you just have to find it. I searched for over 4 years for the documentation on the HS I23 biplane dive bomber. It came from as far away as Poland and Berlin, Germany. Sometimes when you find what you want it takes time but its worth it.

THE ANTIQUE AIRPLANE ASSOCIATION

The Antique Airplane Association Fly In will be held the last week of August in Blakesburg, Iowa. You have to be a member to attend but the membership is worth it, as well



as the visit to Blakesburg. About 20 miles out from the field you start to notice the air traffic overhead and some very unique

airplanes milling around the sky. Everything from WWI Jenny's to modern classics are in attendance each year and you never know for sure what's going to turn up.



Is it like the EAA Air Venture? No. Its more relaxed and everyone there seems like they are glad to see you. The home made pies on the library porch are mouth watering from

the Blakesburg Historical Society, and you can't get the blackberry pie that I already have reserved!

Stop and share a little shade under a wing, or

go over to the hangars where you can have a light breakfast or lunch. Coffee mugs are available each year's event but get them

ouick or they'll disappear. The same goes for the T-shirts and other goodies. It's a good time on a grass field,

COMPETITION DOCS/FORMS


This is one of the more exciting features of the web-site. We have all the competition forms and documents for scale competition online in pdf form. Not only are the documents up-to-date, but we now have two versions of each.

One is the regular pdf that we invite contest directors to download and printout for use in their contests.

The second (and more exciting) version of the form is the "intelligent" form. Using this version and an up-to-date version of Adobe's Acrobat Reader, you can fill out all your information using your computer, then pre-print copies to take to your next scale event: information about yourself, your plane and your manuevers/options. All AMA rule book manuevers/options (as spelled out in the current AMA rule book) can be selected from pull-down menus; right on the .pdf. Imagine not having to spend time at your next contest filling out forms!

Oh, one more thing - the forms do NOT allow you to fill in your own scores! Sorry - some things are best left up to the judges!

Trust me - its much safer to stay in the middle.





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
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
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
